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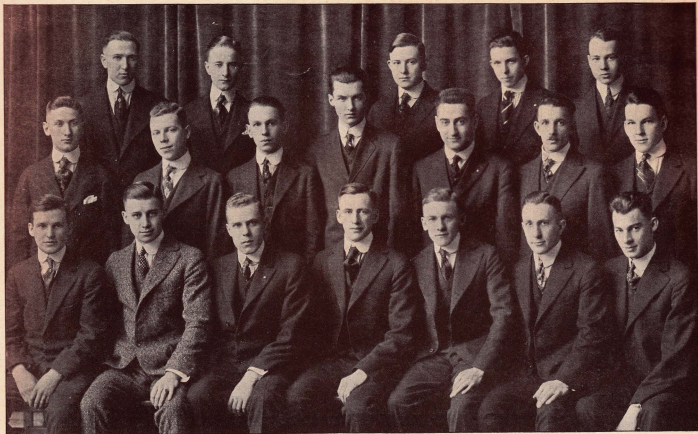

## RULES GOVERNING HOUSE FUND

### I

#### House Fund Committee

This committee shall be composed of three active men: a Senior, who shall act as Chairman; a Junior and a Sophomore. The Sophomore member shall be elected from the Freshman class at the regular spring election of officers, and shall serve for three years. In case any member becomes inactive, a special election may be called at any time during the school year.

Duties: This committee shall attend to the signing of all notes; keep the record of all notes up to date; collect all money and deposit it with the Custodian and send out notices as the notes mature—the first notice to be given at least thirty (30) days prior to the maturity of any note.

### II

#### Custodian

This office shall be filled by an alumnus and he shall preferably be located in the city of Cleveland, Ohio. In case of a vacancy in this office, it shall be filled by an appointment made by the Investment Committee.

Duties: The incoming money from the Chairman of the House Fund Committee is to be received by the Custodian, for which a receipt shall be given to said Chairman and the money deposited in the bank. The Custodian shall also keep a record of all investments made by the Investment Committee.

### III

#### Investment Committee

This committee shall be composed of three men: two Alumni and the Chairman of the House Fund Committee. In case of a vacancy of one of the Alumni members, the other two members of the committee shall fill the vacancy by appointing another alumnus subject to the approval of the active chapter.

Duties: This committee shall act with the Custodian to invest the money in safe bonds, preferably Municipal bonds.

### IV

#### General Regulations

1. All men filling the above described offices shall be either active or alumni members of Delta Alpha Chapter of the Sigma Nu Fraternity.

2. The bank book shall stand in the name of Delta Alpha Chapter of Sigma Nu and subject to the joint order of three trustees who shall be the three members of the Investment Committee. All bonds or other securities bought by the Investment Committee shall be left in trust with some banking house or some reliable firm, subject to the joint order of the three members of this committee.

3. This fund shall not be used by the fraternity for any purpose other than that of acquiring a chapter house, without the consent of the donors.

4. Upon payment of a note and its subsequent removal from the note book, the person receiving said payment shall date and sign both stub and note.

5. The bank book or books and all records of the Custodian and Finance Committee shall be inspected twice each year by a man chosen from the active chapter.

6. If at any time Delta Alpha Chapter shall become extinct the money in this fund or that obtained by the sale of the property shall revert to the original donors.

7. These rules and regulations may be amended by a majority vote of the active chapter, said amendment then to be sanctioned by at least ten (10) alumni.

#### THE HOUSE FUND

It is the custom of Delta Alpha for each man upon leaving the chapter to subscribe one hundred dollars to the House Fund. This custom has been observed with but few exceptions and there is now subscribed from this source and from that of a few loyal Sigs who were instrumental in the founding of the chapter, the sum of \$3,140.00. Of this amount \$895.00 has been paid in. Accumulated interest on this money is \$61.31, making the total cash on hand \$956.31.
