

AT HIGH COUNCIL AND TRI-DIVISIONAL

REPRESENTING DELTA ALPHA

Last November, fourteen brothers travelled to Bethany, West Virginia to represent Delta Alpha at the combined High Council and Tri-Divisional meeting. The meeting was held in the Millsop Leadership Center on the campus of Bethany College and was hosted by the members of Epsilon Chapter. It was attended by the members of the High Council, representatives from the twelve chapters of Divisions 8, 9 and 12, and other distinguished Sigma Nu alumni.

Clark Walters, Commander of our division, opened the Tri-Divisional meeting on the afternoon of Saturday, November 5 by welcoming the representatives and introducing the dignitaries. The High Council then excused itself and moved to another room to continue the meeting that had begun the day before. Kylè Faulkner, DA 843 served on the High Council as a collegiate representative, a high honor for him and our chapter. Also attending the High Council meeting was Will Schmidt, DA 845 who was later invited to serve on the Long Range Planning Committee. Topics discussed at the High Council meeting ranged from budgetary matters to the activities of the regional consultants at various problem chapters.

that no more hazing would be tolerated by Sigma Nu National.

After Sherratt finished, Judd Heflin, regional consultant, took the floor to explain the many services that National provides, including alumni files, newsletter service, mechandise and other services that many chapters have not been taking full advantage of.

After a short break, John Cluss, Commander of Division 8, gave a lecture on the law and organization of Sigma Nu, including the process for changing the law at the Grand Chapters Meeting, to be held this summer. Following the speech by Cluss, a multi-media presentation entitled Sigma Nu Spectacular was shown. Included in this show were many slides of historical interest and of current Sigma Nu activities. The meeting was then recessed until the next day. After the meeting, the representatives gathered in a group dining room in Benedum Commons for a social hour. The representatives from Delta Alpha started the evening on a lighter note by demonstrating their technique in a quick game of shit-shit. Shortly afterwards, the representatives were treated to a dinner catered by the college food service.

Immediately following dinner, and several short speeches by local and national dignitaries, came the event which enabled Delta Alpha to muster fourteen brothers to attend: the debut and final performance of the Delta Alpha Glee Club. Gerald Sherratt, while attending the Active-Alumni Semiformal last year, was impressed by our enthusiasm during the singing of the White Star and before we knew it, we were committed to sing at Bethany. What is a Fraternity?

At first glance a fraternity is a social club. The most striking features are the organized social events, intramurals, and the pranks and horseplay of any large group of twenty-year old men. Still, all of these are available in a dormitory or an apartment. So why join a fraternity?

First and most important, every member develops deep friendships that continue long after graduation. There is a sense of "all for one and one for all" that is lacking in the dorms. Second, whether a member holds an office or simply carries out his duties, he becomes more responsible and dependable. Finally, each member now has a house and a home in which he can truly develop a pride.

These characteristics add a fresh and exciting dimension to college life. The fraternity is something else to work for besides a diploma. It is a place to live and work with people who have left the apathy of the dorms. It provides a home where one can develop a true sense of belonging and pride. These feelings separate a fraternity from a dorm or a club.

Once you have begun to consider fraternities, how do you pick one? How do they differ? We at Sigma Nu pride ourselves on two noticeable areas of uniqueness. First, our ideals, and second, our diversity, set us apart from the rest of the fraternities.

We are probably the most diverse house on campus. There is no typical Sigma Nu. Note how each Sigma Nu who comes to rush you is different from any other. It requires far more effort to make a fraternity work if it is based on honor and diversity than on fines and stereotypes, but the end product is much more rewarding.

When all the shouting has died down, we at Sigma Nu realize we are at school for primarily one reason - to learn. Therefore, we do place a heavy emphasis on academics. This does not mean we are a fraternity of nerds; it does mean we allow a brother to pursue academics to the degree he desires. Sigma Nu consistently has a combined grade point that is above the all men's average. Also, should you encounter difficulty with a subject, you will nearly always find a brother able and willing to help you out.





Sigma Nu is based on respect for each other. We are an honor fraternity, with no fines or penalties for misconduct. Sigma Nu is a diverse house, with no stereotyped image, allowing each of us to develop in the directions we choose. No one is required to change to become a Sigma Nu. All that we ask is that our members care enough about the house to. demand change when needed, and who will work voluntarily because they care.

In becoming Sigma Nu's, we have found more than a house. We have found a home.





DELTA ALPHA NEWS

In the Spring of 1975, the Delta Alpha Alumni Chapter adopted a scholarship program for undergraduates of Delta Alpha. At that time, a formal trust fund was established as were three specific awards:

1. an award of up to \$150 to the chapter for attaining certain scholastic standards or substantially improving its ranking among other on-campus fraternities,

2. a \$100 award to the graduating Senior with the highest cumulative grade point average, and 3. the Charles Jackson Hammond Award, which recognizes the Sigma Nu who has contributed significantly to Case and the University Community through chapter, campus, and community activities.

Plans were made to expand the scholarship program when additional fund became available. Through contributions and interest income from the trust fund, the Alumni Chapter is now in a financial position to consider the creation of additional awards.

Scholarship Questionnaire

NOTE YOUR CHOICE BY CIRCLING THE APPROPRIATE LETTER.

1. Additional scholarship awards to individuals should be based on:

- a. highest grade point averages (GPA). b. most improvement in GPA.
- 2. If awards to individuals are based on high GPA, I favor rewarding the:
 - a. highest GPA in a single semester.
 - b. highest GPA in a one year period (Fall and Spring semester combined).
 - c. highest GPA in any two consecutive semesters (e.g. Spring of Sophomore year and Fall of Junior year).
 - d. brother in each class with the highest cumulative GPA at the end of the school year.
- 3. If awards to individuals are based on improvement, they should recognize the:
 - a. largest improvement from one semester's GPA to another.
 - b. largest improvement in cumulative GPA from one semester to another.
 - c. biggest improvement in cumulative GPA from one year to another (e.g. from the end of the Sophomore year to the end of the Junior year).

d. biggest improvement of the semester GPA over the cumulative GPA.

- 4. If awards to individuals are based on GPA improvement:
 - a. the highest percentage increase should be rewarded (4.0 2.5 = 1.5 so) there is a 1.5 / 2.5 = 60% improvement).
 - b. the greatest improvement in actual points should be rewarded (4.0 2.5 = 1.5 points of improvement).
- 5. If a brother wins one scholarship award:
 - a. he should be eliminated from competition for future scholarship awards, except the Hammond Award).
 - b. he should still be permitted to compete for any future awards.
