Alumni Active Candidate (AAC) Thanksgiving Dinner Saturday, Nov. 19th, 2005

A Rock and A Cup; Movin' on Up!

The men of Delta Alpha Chapter did it again, winning their second consecutive *Rock Chapter Award* from the International Fraternity at the Sigma Nu Grand Chapter convention, held in St. Louis, MO, on July 21-25th, 2004. Collegiate delegates Bryan T. Dillon (ΔA 1178) and Lee E. Christiansen (ΔA 1180) accepted the award on behalf of the chapter, at a banquet also attended by Alumni Chapter delegate and Ritual Committee Commander James H. Paxton (ΔA1082), Great Lakes Alpha Divisional Commander James P. Gero (ΔA 930), and House Corporation Trustee Michael V. Jaszczak (ΔA 980).

Sigma Nu's High Council presents the *Rock Chapter Award* once every two years to outstanding collegiate chapters as a means of recognizing overall chapter excellence during the preceding three years. Established in 1982, it is the highest honor that a collegiate chapter can receive from the international fraternity. Delta Alpha Chapter was one of only eight of the fraternity's 183 active chapters chosen to receive the award in 2004.

The collegiate chapter also earned another award in St. Louis – the *Bronze Cup of Sigma Nu* – for attaining the second-highest grade point average among all Sigma Nu chapters (3.409 G.P.A.). Although the chapter has received the *Sigma Nu Certificate of Commendation* (third place) on several occasions, this is the first time that Delta Alpha Chapter has received one of the top two awards for fraternity scholarship since receiving the first-place Gallagher Cup in 1937.

The 62^{nd} Grand Chapter is scheduled for July 15-19th, 2006, in Indianapolis, Indiana.


2005 Δ **A** / Δ **Z** Hall of Honor Inductee: George Bowman Δ Z 69

Hall of Honor Recipient Announced:

Nearly thirty years after his death, the combined Delta Alpha / Delta Zeta Alumni Chapter has named Brother George Arvene Bowman (ΔZ 0069, Western Reserve) to the Delta Alpha / Delta Zeta Hall of Honor, the local chapter's highest alumni award.

Born in Galion (OH) on 11 May 1893, Brother Bowman was initiated by the fraternity's Western Reserve Chapter in 1915. He demonstrated a prodigious talent for teaching, and by the age of twenty-one had already risen to the position of superintendent of the Edison (OH) school system. After graduating from W.R.U. in 1917, Bowman joined the Navy engineers aboard the steamship U.S.S. Massachusetts during World War I, returning home to become director of athletics and later principal at Zanesville (OH) High School. On 11 July 1923, he married Edith Fraser Duncan, a fellow schoolteacher. The following day they moved to Chillicothe (OH), where he became superintendent of schools until 1928. Later, while superintendent of the Marion (OH) School District (1929-1934), he earned his A.M. degree from Columbia University. From 1934 to 1941 he was Superintendent of Lakeview (OH) schools, before becoming superintendent of schools for the city of Youngstown, Ohio. On 1 July 1944, Bowman became the fifth President of Kent State University (Kent, OH), a position he would retain for the next two decades.

While a collegiate member of Delta Zeta Chapter, Bowman served as Chaplain (1916-1917) and Fifth Division Chapter Representative (Pittsburgh, 1916). However, it was his involvement in alumni affairs that generated the most



interest from the alumni awards committee in 2005. Brother Bowman was a fixture at Cleveland alumni gatherings despite the meandering course of his educational career. While President of Kent State University, Bowman was a vocal advocate for the Greek system, and a staunch supporter of Zeta Gamma Chapter (Kent State), founded there in 1949. Within the International Fraternity, Brother Bowman served on the Sigma Nu Educational Foundation Board of Directors from 1956 to 1968, including eight years (1960-1968) as Vice President of the Foundation. Shortly before his death on 7 May 1976, Brother Bowman donated \$10,000 to the Educational Foundation account of Delta Alpha Chapter, ensuring that the legacy of Sigma Nu Fraternity in Cleveland would be well guarded, despite the demise of his beloved Delta Zeta Chapter.

Modeled upon Sigma Nu International Fraternity's award by the same name, the *Delta Alpha / Delta Zeta Hall of Honor Award* was established in 1989 to recognize Sigma Nu's most dedicated Cleveland alumni. Length, depth, and breadth of service to Sigma Nu Fraternity are the primary considerations in selecting recipients. Bowman is only the 22nd man from among the more than 1,500 combined Delta Alpha and Delta Zeta Chapter alumni to receive the award, and the fifth to hail from the fraternity's Western Reserve chapter.

The History of Sigma Nu in Cleveland (1899-2005)

After nearly a decade of research, the first comprehensive history of Sigma Nu in Cleveland is scheduled to be unveiled at the 100th anniversary celebration of Delta Alpha Chapter in May 2007. The History of Sigma Nu in Cleveland (1899-2005), compiled and edited by Brother James H. Paxton (ΔΑ 1082 / Α 0449, V.M.I.), will recount the long and remarkable legacy of Sigma Nu's many collegiate and alumni organizations within the city of Cleveland, beginning with the formation of the Cleveland Sigma Nu Alumni Club in 1899.

Originally conceived in 1997 as a supplement to Delta Alpha Chapter's candidate education program, the <u>History</u> project now lists dozens of collegiate and alumni members of the fraternity as contributing writers, including many first-hand anecdotal accounts of fraternity life in Cleveland over the last century. Brothers who have not yet contributed their own stories and perspectives to the project may still do so, by emailing Brother Paxton at <u>paxtonius@hotmail.com</u>, or mailing him directly at 1350 West Bethune Street, Apartment 805, Detroit MI, 48202.

A significant budget has been allotted by Delta Alpha / Delta Zeta Alumni Chapter for hardcover publication of the book, allowing Brothers to purchase their own copies at greatly reduced cost. Although the final cost of the book is yet to be determined, we hope to be able to provide a complimentary copy of the book to all alumni purchasing tickets to the 100th anniversary dinner in 2007. Since most living alumni of Sigma Nu's Delta Alpha and Delta Zeta Chapters will be mentioned in this book, we are sure that each of you will want one for your own personal libraries.

Since our reorganization in 1989, the Alumni Chapter and House Corporation have awarded close to \$40,000.00 in scholarships. The current scholarships (awarded on 9/10/05 and paid on 10/9/05) total \$5,760.00. To be eligible for any of our individual awards, Brothers must fill out and sign grade release forms. Brothers who don't complete grade release forms when due are not eligible.

<u>First Achievement Award</u> - This award pays for pledging and initiation fees (currently \$270.00) for new Brothers that achieve a semester or cumulative GPA of 2.75 or higher in the semester they are initiated. This award was created in Spring 1997 and 91% of Brothers have received the award.

<u>High GPA Upper-class Award</u> - This award goes to the Junior or Senior Brother(s) with the highest GPA, based on the Spring Semester cumulative GPA

Leadership Ethics Achievement Development



National has composed a theory called Values-Based Recruitment (VBR) and is encouraging every chapter to utilize this theory to create an environment for recruitment that is focused around four basic principles: Balance, Support, Success, and Friendship. Basically, VBR theory is intended to be used when designing recruitment events, carrying on a conversation and during all other interactions with potential members. If implemented correctly, recruitment will be more effective and meaningful. Within this theory they gave many useful tips and information for recruiting but since it is just a theory every individual chapter has to take the basic concepts and cater them to their own needs. The Delta Alpha chapter of Sigma Nu has done just that, especially this last Fall semester. We have kept many of the same recruitment events that have done for years, such as having a Barbea n d Whirlyball going t o q u e (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Whirlyball) On the other hand, as a chapter we have made the interactions with the potential members at those events more impacting and meaningful for both the potential members and the brothers. In order for this to happen, we as a chapter had to come together for a recruitment workshop. During this workshop the chapter was educated about the main concepts of the Values-Based Recruitment Theory. Also, brothers were given tips on how to recruit more effectively and were shown how to integrate this new knowledge into

Greek Week

Sigma Nu has been consistently at the top of the final Greek Week standings for the past several years. This past spring Sigma Nu finished third overall in Greek Week taking first place in root beer chug, Greek sing, and second in variety show. Two years ago, the University stepped in and made Greek Life change the rules to rope pull. University lawyers feared being sued due to fraternity members "cutting weight" in order to make the weight limit. The rules were changed so that no weight limit exists anymore, and each team can only put ten people on the rope. Many say that this has severely altered the event and that the competition once associated with the event is now gone. Regardless of the discrepancy between the total weights of teams (as much as one thousand pounds), Sigma Nu has always performed with honor

Sigma Nu has also performed very well for the past few years as well. In 2004, we finished second overall in Greek Week taking first in Greek sing and variety show as well as second in pyramid. In 2003, we finished fifth overall taking second in pyramid and chug. In 2002, we finished fifth overall taking second in chug as well as third in both banner and rope pull. In 2001, we finished third overall taking first in pyramid, second in chug, and third in spot shot and rope pull.

Philanthropy

In the past three years, Sigma Nu has lead Case's campus in philanthropy, easily exceeding the goals set by the University. We have participated in dozens of events, both on a large scale and on an individual level. A perennial favorite among brothers has been the Haunted Hayride, in which the men voluntarily act out scenes at a local park for passing families; this generally occurs on the weekends approaching Halloween. The program is impressive in its size; Sigma Nu generally puts forth 20 men each night, giving us a huge presence during the event. Another large-scale activity in the spring is the Science Olympiad finals, which are hosted annually by Case. During the Olympiad, brothers volunteer to act as judges or safety officers for a variety of science-themed contests, including a bottle rocket shoot-off and a bridge building competition.

Smaller teams of brothers often select more specific events to attend, generally in groups of four to eight. An event started last year was the RePlay for Kids workshops, which are run by a campus-based organization . The program refurbishes consumer-grade electronic children's toys, adapting them for use by special needs youth. The adaptations generally involve reverse engineering the toy design in order to install an easily activated switch, designed to be used as an indicator in various activities. This program is enjoyed by many because it combines community service with electrical engineering, which is currently the most common major among active brothers.

In the spring, Sigma Nu will be hosting the first annual 8-hour Capture the Flag tournament. Each person entering will pay an entry fee, which will then be donated to a specific charity via the Sigma Nu national Helping Hands Initiative. The CaseCapture group, started by Evan Heiser (DA11 and Zach Fredin, has been successful enough in its biweekly pickup games (started this summer) that there are several Greek organizations already expressing interest in participating in the philanthropy event.

New Beginnings

Every fall brings new changes for Sigma Nu. The buzz of new in-house brothers, Recruitment, and more advanced classes bring a plateful of new changes. When all the new activity became a bit overwhelming, it was always comforting to stop by the kitchen and visit with "Mark the Cook." Our cook's familiar presence has always made the house feel more like home.

This September, our chef of 10 years, Mark Fatheree. retired from his position to join his wife Lisa; her promotion had relocated her to Chicago since last April. Those who knew Mark will miss his outrageous stories and far-flung theories. Others will miss his the long hours he put into Rush: preparing chicken wings



before Poker and Movie Nights or meals for Bid Dinner. Still others will miss playing poker and bowling with him. 

Held in the City View banquet hall, the dance floor was set up in the middle with the tables evenly divided on either side. Everyone had a fantastic view of the East Bank of the Flats and the river. 43 brothers attended this event, either with date or stag, and each received a Pilsner commemorating the event, while the dates received similar flutes. Brothers,

The House Corporation reports that the operation of the chapter house has run smoothly for the past several years and that positive cash flow from Fall, Spring, and Summer rentals has allowed us to maintain the house well and save for future projects. My space is limited, so here is an abridged version on the updates on the new chapter house.

The new Case "Master Plan" includes the replacement of every dorm on campus as well as most Greek housing within the next 10 years. Eventually, all undergraduates are supposed to be housed North of Euclid Avenue and there will be a graduate village built in place of the dorms on South-side. However, that timeline is highly suspect, given the University's actual timing with previous projects and the fact that they're said to be well over budget (as expected) and short on cash.

For Sigma Nu, theoretically, this means that the Chapter should be relocated to a new house on North-side (Juniper Road). Based on statements by University officials, we were originally hopeful that we would be residing in the new house before our 100th Anniversary celebration in 2007. However, given the total lack of progress on the Greek housing front for the past 2+ years, I estimate the odds of that occurring to be about 10%. Furthermore, the plan that the University has most recently presented is miserable on most issues - the mock house design ideas are very uninformed and the financial arrangements are totally unacceptable. Luckily, it doesn't appear that the University will try to replace our chapter house without our consent, as it occurred forty years ago.

We will eventually be asking for input and financial help to customize the new house from Alumni. We can't offer you any specifics yet because the University has not provided information on which any group can responsibly act. If you would like to donate toward the new house in the near future, I would recommend that you make a tax deductible donation to the Sigma Nu Educational Foundation and specifically earmark your donation to the Delta Alpha Chapter at CWRU. Furthermore, I would suggest that you redirect money that you currently donate to Case to the Foundation. I think that Case will only begin to take seriously the negative impact that the Greek housing proposal will have once they feel a reduction in donations from Greek alumni. I personally will not donate to Case until I feel that our Chapter is treated fairly with respect to the proposed Greek housing.
